Dr. Darlene Konkle became the veterinary emergency program manager for the Division of Animal Health in August 2007, after working for one and a half years in the Johne's Disease Control Program. In her new position, she is part of a team committed to assuring a healthy animal population and a safe food supply for Wisconsin. Darlene helps coordinate Wisconsin's response to new and emerging

diseases that could threaten animals and animal agriculture. This involves reviewing and updating the state's emergency response plans and providing training to division staff. She also provides education and outreach to the public on animal health emerging issues, emergency management, disease control programs and biosecurity practices. She works closely with USDA-APHIS, the Wisconsin Veterinary

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
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Diagnostic Laboratory, the Division of Public Health, the UW School of Veterinary Medicine, UW-Extension and WARN.

One project of special importance for which Darlene is responsible is updating the Wisconsin Animal Health Emergency Management System (WAHEMS) strategic plan. WAHEMS represents a public-private partnership. The goal is to minimize the impact of an animal disease outbreak or a disaster affecting animal health by maximizing all resources in the state. There are many stakeholders in Wisconsin's animal health system – the agriculture industry, DATCP, UW-Extension, and private veterinarians, to name a few. WAHEMS brings these stakeholders together with a shared understanding of their roles and responsibilities in an animal health emergency. Since the WAHEMS strategic plan was drafted in 2004, there have been changes. New stakeholders have emerged, and others have dropped out. By working together, industry can plan, prepare and respond to protect Wisconsin's animal health and animal agriculture from any threat. Dairy Industry Business Continuity Response Planning

Each day sixty-six (66) million lbs. of raw milk moves across the state of Wisconsin. In the event of a foreign animal disease (such as foot and mouth disease [FMD]), this movement of milk would be stopped for likely a minimum of 72 hours. Six Wisconsin cheese companies, WMMB and DATCP have begun work on drafting an animal health incident response plan that focuses on this important business continuity issue. The plan will develop a set of best management practices for farms, milk transporters and processing plants to 1) proactively prevent or mitigate an outbreak, and 2) effectively respond to an outbreak. A coordinated public sector and private



industry response with identified roles and responsibilities for each sector will help ensure continued dairy industry viability. Contact Matt Mathison for more information on this project.

Pork Producers Ethical Principles Include Food Safety Element

Delegates at the National Pork Industry Forum recently adopted "Ethical Standards for U.S. Pork Producers" (http://www.pork.org/NewsAndInformation/docs/IR1NPBTFEthicalPrinciples.pdf), a statement showing that U.S. pork producers recognize their obligation to build and maintain the trust of customers and the public in their products and their practices.

Food safety is included in the statement as one of the ethical principles and code of conduct. Other areas defined in the document include animal well being, environment, public health, employee care, and the local community. Contact Tammy Vaassen for more information on this program.

WARN working with DATCP on Food System Flow Charts

As reported in the last issue of the WARN E-News, several members of the ag and food industry had worked with Kristin Gunther, Planning Analyst with the Wisconsin DATCP, to develop a food system flow chart entitled *Characterizing Wisconsin's Food Systems from Production to Consumption: A Reference Document* (http://datcp.state.wi.us/fs/business/food/publications/pdf/CharacWIFoodDistribSystem.pdf) that describes the movement of livestock, milk, vegetables and cranberries through processing and delivery to consumers. The purpose was to document the flow as part of a statewide emergency food response plan and for the Homeland Security protocols that require DATCP to identify and characterize critical food resources in the state.
